Public Consultation Open for Essex Local Nature Recovery Strategy

Recovery Strategy (LNRS) provides a new vision for our natural spaces, and the draft strategy is open for public consultation for your input and feedback. Introduced by the Environment Act in 2021, the strategy identifies opportunities for the creation of new habitats, which are most likely to provide the greatest benefit for nature and the wider environment. It has been created with input from landowners, farmers, environmental NGOs, charities, local authorities and members of the public. The draft LNRS outlines biodiversity priorities for nature recovery in the county as well as a series of proposed actions, known as potential measures, to achieve these. Your participation is crucial for delivering a robust strategy which collectively we can use to work towards nature recovery, shaping a thriving natural environment for Essex. BIG BOOK FAIR RETURNS TO STANWAY SCHOOL

After a successful move to Stanway School last year, Colchester NSPCC's Annual Book Fair will be returning to the Winstree Road (CO3 0QA) location on Saturday, 2nd and Sunday 3rd November. The fair will be open from 9am to 3pm on both days, with stock replenished on the second day. Admission is £1.50 with under-16s free.

Now in its 33rd year, the event is a haven for booklovers with thousands of carefully sorted donated books, some now out of print, plus jigsaws, games, DVDs and CDs.

Last year's book fair raised more than £11,000 for the childcare charity, which relies on fundraising activities, donations, gifts and legacies for nearly 90% of its annual income. Public support is crucial to fund the NSPCC's child protection work, including its Childline and Schools Services.

Pastoral Ponderings



I wonder what is your favourite cake or dessert. Do you have something which, no matter how full you are from the first course – if it is offered for dessert you find it difficult to say 'no'?

Today as I look through my diary of the various things to do and meetings I need to attend, I also have written 'bake cake'! I have a group meeting at the Rectory tomorrow morning, and I am sure that cake would be appreciated. I am also driving south to see my parents on my day off — an early celebration for Mum's birthday — so a home baked cake would, I am sure, be a welcome addition to afternoon tea.

It is fascinating to see our local landscape as it continues on its annual kaleidoscope of change – the greens and gold of the various cereal crops having now been harvested, the straw baled and the stubble being turned in, once again to soil. The vegetables and fruits in the garden taking forever to ripen, and as was the case for me – either providing one or two precious and long-awaited fruits to pick and savour, or a glut (especially of tomatoes), with the need for creative cooking ideas, so I could freeze, for later in the year.

We are in the midst of the harvest celebrations across the benefice and in our schools. We turn our thoughts to thinking a little more about our impact on the environment — what we put in, as well as the fruits we are thankful for getting out of the land — I wondered about the ingredients and the food miles travelled to bake a simple cake!

I am making a lemon and lime drizzle cake and a chocolate brownie – the former – a Mary Berry recipe and the latter - a tried and tested BBC Good Food recipe – both cakes are firm favourites with me as they easily accommodate the substitution of gluten free flour! The chocolate brownie is a little decadent – but the key ingredient is, I am afraid, one of my 'hard to say no' indulgences.

In fact, with eggs from a neighbour, and butter, flour, and sugar all produced and grown in the UK, it is really only the lemon and lime and the chocolate, which has come from further afield.

Perhaps as we make our favourite meals, or sit down to eat, we can be thankful for the many hands that have worked hard to get the food to our table – whether that is our own, labouring in the garden and greenhouse, our local farmers or those further afield, as well as those in food manufacturing, packaging, transportation and our local shops and supermarkets. Below is one of the prayers which we will use in our harvest services:

Eternal God, you crown the year with your goodness and you give us the fruits of the earth in their season: grant that we may use them to your glory, for the relief of those in need and for our own well-being; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you,



in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. **Rev Claire Wilkinson,** Team Vicar.

Music in our Area

Some time ago the Editor, knowing of my interest in musical matters, asked if I might write a piece for Lookout on something to do with the subject. So I offer the following, hoping it may be of some interest to some of you.

You may not all be familiar with the Quaker Meeting House in Sudbury. Nigel and I have been to several concerts there. It is a delightful, peaceful building, set back from the road in Friars Street and practically next door, helpfully, to The Secret Garden - also a charming building with a characterful French café/restaurant inside which offers delicious things to eat.

Our most recent concert at the Meeting House was given by The Gainsborough Ensemble* - a group of fine musicians on flute, cello and other instruments. The cellist, Natasha Holmes, will be known to some of you as a frequent member of the congregation at Alphamstone. For this concert Natasha was joined by Pavlo Beznosiuk, violin, to give an engrossing recital of three items under the theme of "War and Peace" - a very appropriate programme specially chosen to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the birth of George Fox, the founder of the pacifist Quaker movement.


The programme opened with a cello solo introduced by Natasha - Pablo Casals' - "Song of the Birds". I had not realised that Casals was not only a performer on the cello, but also composed and arranged music. This piece, which is based on a Catalan folksong (Casals was a proud Catalan), depicts birds calling out "peace, peace, peace" and was delightful. During the First World War Casals worked to help Spanish refugees fleeing Franco's fascist forces. The Song of the Birds was often included in concerts he gave to comfort his fellow countrymen and raise money to help the refugees.

Our second piece today was "Sonata La Guerra" by JP von Westhoff, a 17th century composer and violinist whose work was influenced by the disruption of the 30 years' war raging round him in his lifetime, and who had a major influence on a generation of

German violinists, as well as the compositions of JS Bach. This sonata comprises six separate short pieces on the subject of war - with fierce combat sometimes conveyed by the violin, and warlike noises from the cello. It was really evocative of conflict, and most skilfully performed, the violin part being particularly intricate.

Finally, in complete contrast, we had "Ferdinand the Bull" by Alan Ridout, performed by Pavlo on the violin and narrated by Natasha. Some of you may have read the book to your children**. It's a wonderful tale of a bull who just did not want to engage in any kind of conflict with his fellows, who were all attacking each other using their horns to advantage in preparation for the bullring. Ferdinand just wanted to sit under his favourite tree, smelling the flowers. It might spoil the story to go on but I recommend it, and if you get the chance to listen to this musical version I know you will enjoy it. Pavlo conveyed the atmosphere on his violin, and Natasha's narration was delightfully humorous and gentle.

I have had the inspiring experience of attending a Quaker meeting in this building once many years ago, and again in, I think, 2012, when Terry Waite (released from his 4 years of captivity in Beirut in 1991) re-dedicated it - and so it has a special place in my heart. I will remember the 400th anniversary of the birth of George Fox as a very



special occasion, so appropriately and beautifully celebrated there by these musicians.

Lest anyone think that classical concerts might be just a bit too serious, moments of humour often occur, sometimes quite unscheduled – for example, when halfway through one of the (serious) introductions by Pavlo, someone in the audience gave the most enormous sneeze. Pavlo, not turning a hair, said "bless you" and carried on. I have also heard an appreciative dog in the audience voice his approval most enthusiastically at the end of a beautiful flute and cello recital at one of the lunchtime concerts in Holy Trinity Church, Long Melford. The audience laughter on both occasions displaying how relaxed everyone felt at the same time as appreciating a fine performance.

From all of which it is apparent that Sudbury's music scene offers high quality listening to a broad spectrum of music aficionados, in what could perhaps be described as an inclusive and relaxed spirit?



Melinda Varcoe Writes:

I don't know why, perhaps it's the slight shiver on getting out of bed this morning, but although it's only early September as I write, I'm feeling it's time to explore some autumnal thoughts. The arrival of October can be a bit depressing, despite the technicolour trees, with the prospect of cold grey days ahead, so let's lighten the mood and avoid any mention of Hallowe'en (a vastly overhyped commercial exercise which does nothing to lift the spirits).

- Did you know that the Old English name for October was Winterfylleth, marking the beginning of winter? According to AH Gray, author of The Northumbrian Saga, the Saxons divided the year in two, according to the length of days and nights. "Their whole year revolved around the tasks and activities they had to carry out in the warmer periods and as a result when they referred to how old something or someone was in years, they used the season of winter. For example, 'he was 18 winters old' or 'she has lived in that house for three winters.' Everything else, from the month of May until the beginning of October, was known simply as summer. Autumn is a word that didn't come into being until the 17th century as people preferred to refer to this season as the harvest season. Likewise spring is a later term from the 16th century meaning first season of the year". Interestingly, this is still largely the case in Greece, where 'winter' (xeimonas) starts as soon as the heat of summer begins to abate, and it isn't summer until the first tourists arrive again!
- There have been over a thousand commercial recordings of the melancholy song 'Autumn Leaves' (or 'Feuilles Mortes' in the original French) since Yves Montand's version in 1946. A 1955 instrumental version remains the best-selling piano record of all time.
- Since 1990, October 21st has been designated Apple Day in the UK. Although there's a long and proud history of cider-making, particularly in the West Country, our region is less well-known for growing this fruit. But if you look online there is some interesting information from the East of England Apples & Orchards Project, where I discovered that there are still at least 11 varieties of apple indigenous to Suffolk. The website tells us that 'Suffolk's orchards are located mainly on the clay soils found in the east and south east, where the county's principal river valleys are located. The farming traditions in this area led to a scattered pattern of small orchards, often associated with farmhouses and manors. Many of these are now unmanaged and nearing the end of their natural lives, making them vulnerable to change of use and development'. This is sad, but dedicated growers and experimenters are keeping old varieties going and working on strengthening stock and hybridising for the future.

Another nice apple fact is that the variety Suffolk Pink, identified only in the late 1970s, is named for the specific colour that has been used for centuries for painting houses in this part of the UK. From the 14th century, builders added substances such as elderberries, blackthorn, sloes or pig or ox blood, to the exterior lime-wash. Today there are several shades of pink used for historic Suffolk houses, such as rose pink, shell pink, raspberry and geranium. Count them up next time you visit Lavenham!

Adrian Huggins writes:-

This summer saw the launch at Wedgwood House in the West Suffolk Hospital, Bury St Edmunds, of a new therapy garden for patients with a range of mental health issues. It has been recognized for some time that gardening has a powerful place in helping troubled minds reconnect with themselves and others, and in building self-confidence and hope for the future.

At the opening Dr Sue Stuart-Smith, a prominent psychiatrist and psychotherapist, recounted the history of Saint Hildegard of Bingen, a German Benedictine abbess, composer, theologian, poet, mystic visionary, and medicinal herbalist, who developed a philosophy based on the connection between the human spirit and the force of the earth which she called viriditas, combining the Latin for green (viridis) and truth (veritas). She understood that people only thrive when the natural world thrives and identified the inescapable link between the health of the planet and human and spiritual health. She was clearly a forerunner of the modern ecological movement.

I would encourage anyone reading this to visit the garden at Wedgwood House, to support any similar project nearer to home, and to find yourself a copy of Sue Stuart-Smith's excellent book, The Well Gardened Mind.

Village Hall

Garden Clippings

It is a wet and miserable August Bank Holiday Saturday. Welcome rain for the garden and topping up of the water butts of course. As I write I can observe through the window a Common Heron standing on one of the arched branches protruding from the surface of the millpond. The bulk of the branches are submerged, having fallen from nearby poplars a few years ago. The Heron has a very dapper appearance in its grey, black and white

plumage. It is standing on one leg, the other tucked up under its breast with its foot slightly protruding to the front. It has been there for some time, perhaps hoping for the rain to ease up! I have also watched a kingfisher in the same spot several times of late.

The damp and humid conditions have also brought out the more unwelcome residents of the garden, particularly after dark. The presence of numerous slugs munching away at bedding plants in pots and borders in the sultry conditions has caused exasperation! We think most of the culprits are the Spanish slug as they are large, some about six inches in length, a burnt orange colour with black head and antennae. The small, grey field slug is also present but not in such abundant numbers. One evening there were so many of the larger kind one had to tread very carefully to avoid an unpleasant squashing incident beneath ones foot!

Ants seem to abound too. I observed recently a tiny ant dragging a dead dragonfly up three vertical fronts of steep steps to reach the path at the top of the flight and then continuing along the path heading for the ant's nest presumably. Such a feat of strength and determination. I was mesmerised observing the effort involved. Everywhere I weed or when mowing I seem to disturb an ant nest and then the inevitable jumping up and down to get them off my shoes or legs before I get stung.

What a joy it has been to pick plums and greengages without the usual ever-present risk of being stung by a wasp! However, it does seem very strange not to have them making nests in the roof or lawn or drowning in one's glass of alcoholic beverage on a summers evening. The greengage and Victoria plum crop have been fantastic and are now squirreled away in the freezer or made into jam. So many plums that branches snapped off with the weight. The crab apple and Conference pear trees are also bearing a heavy crop.

We are not sure whether the otters are still visiting/residing in the garden. There has been no evidence of them during the summer months. The river is so very busy during this time. With the proliferation of paddleboarders, kayakers and swimmers along the river one suspects the otters have moved to a quieter location, to avoid the noise and disturbance the human visitors create. We can only hope the otters return when the autumn chill sets in.

It is very busy with birdlife at our birdfeeder. A garrulous group of sparrows are regular visitors and have the choice of elderberries close to the feeder or seeds from the feeder itself. The blue and great tits also enjoy the elderberries. Much as we may moan about the usually unwanted appearance of elder around the garden, it is an important food source for many birds, small mammals and the flowers provide nectar. Many moth caterpillars feed on the elder foliage. We leave this tree in its chosen position as we find the flowers attractive and at this time of year enjoy watching the different species of birds partaking of the berries. SB



David Holland writes:

Hello to you all as we enter the season of mellow fruitfulness. And fruitful it is as the apple trees branches arc towards the ground with their heavy burden. I don't know whether anyone else does this but I always throw the windfalls under the trees around their bases to feed first the blackbirds, and then the fieldfares and redwings who are very welcome visitors from Scotland in the depths of the winter. And if they don't get eaten, then they rot down to feed our glorious old trees.

Hedges are now on my to do list, the nesting bird season moratorium on cutting them now being over. This is important, as I am finding out on my visits to other Parish Councils who report complaints about our ever compromised lanes being overhung with growth. Nesting bird season runs from the 1st March to the 31st of August each year and this constrains us to getting our hedges in order in just six months, usually either in autumn which is best time to control long term overall size, or early in the year when cutting can lead to much stronger regrowth. This is true because cutting in autumn causes the root system to contract to support the now small plant whereas cutting in say February produces a smaller plant with a root system to power a far larger one and so it can burst forth in spring with excess vigour. Well, that's the theory I was told anyway and it does seem to hold true for our garden. The take-away from this is simple: if we don't cut hedges in autumn, then stronger regrowth in spring can lead to more issues on our lanes next year.

As I write, I am aware that we should hear any time now what the Energy Secretary has decided with respect to National Grid's Bramford to Twinstead development consent order application (or planning application). Many will have heard a helicopter hovering over the fields for over an hour recently. These are the fields which will host new energy infrastructure and I am tempted to wonder if that was Ed Miliband, taking in the sights before telling us that he's giving them the goahead.

As I reported recently, the Essex Local Nature Recovery Strategy could be important for us and has the potential to add rewilding of the countryside to the other new demands (including energy infrastructure) on land use in our countryside. An introduction to the public consultation on this is published elsewhere in this edition of Lookout to I won't say more on this other than that I believe it is very important for us to understand what is proposed and where it might happen. A quick look at the maps in the downloadable consultation document will swiftly indicate to you that you live in the area of Essex, that is seen to offer most opportunities

for nature recovery and new woodlands and meadows. The document is easy to digest and colourful so I strongly urge you to download it and take a look. Having formed you views on it, please do respond to the consultation - it is just a click away!

To council matters. The paid for green waste bin collection service has seen far stronger take up than the Council expected and as a result, we can expect little or no increase in the cost for it this year. As many know, I sit on the Planning Committee and it's heartening to see that we saw 58 new affordable homes delivered within the District in the first quarter of the year. Working on this committee really brings home to me just how different our highly rural patch is compared to the urban centres to our south, and that means that the issues that confront us can be very different to those of our urban counterparts. But that makes it all the more important that I work effectively to represent your best interests in a District where most of the land area is countryside with its sparse rural population, but most of the residents live in the southerly urban centres. I am sitting indoors on a Sunday afternoon writing this because it's raining - otherwise I would be outside in the garden tending all those flowers that Pamela loves so much. Despite the coolest summer for over a decade, the ground is very dry and in places cracked, so for me the rain is welcome. However, it is worth remembering that rain does not really water pots, baskets and the plants in containers adequately. So do keep watering your pots because they will keep going for another month if you do - even if that means watering in the rain - a great British garden tradition!





Here's a bit of background to some of the flags...

Tuvalu in the South Pacific, is an independent island nation within the British Commonwealth. Its 9 islands comprise small, thinly populated atolls and reef islands with palm-fringed beaches. Population 11,312 and official languages Tuvaluan and English.

Fiji, in the South Pacific, is an archipelago of more than 300 islands. It is famed for rugged landscapes, palm-lined beaches and coral reefs with clear lagoons. Population 929,766 and official languages Fijian and Englsh.

Niue is a small island nation in the South Pacific and it's known for its limestone cliffs and coral-reef dive sites. Migrating whales swim in Niue's waters between July and October. Population 1,681 and official languages Niue and Englsh.

The above islands sound idyllic places for holidays, but I don't think Ryanair have any direct flights out of Stansted!

A full list of our flag flying days is posted on the village notice board and on the W.St.P. website

The St. George flag will be flown most of the time in between other appointed flags.

We fly some Commonwealth country flags, particularly those that have the Union Jack canton, as an acknowledgement of our proud British heritage.

The W.I. flag will be flown on the 2nd. Tuesday (meeting) and the 3rd. Friday ('Soup & Social' – Village Hall), of each month providing it does not clash with other flags.


