



Pastoral Ponderings



I have been pondering on 'hidden treasures'. I wonder if perhaps many of us have hidden treasures; gifts and skills that perhaps we are too modest to talk about, show off or even use?

Perhaps we store up our material treasures for that rainy day but when that day comes we decide to save it for the storm?

Each of us will have treasures, be it practical, material, emotional, spiritual, gifts of creativity, organisation, administration and many more but I wonder, what do we do with them? I came across a little quote the other day that said, "I have lots of hidden talents... the problem is, even I can't find them"!

Sometimes in our efforts to keep humble or private, we keep our treasures to ourselves, but I can't help thinking what a waste that is.

As Autumn moves on I notice the hidden treasures in the hedgerows, as the flowers of spring and summer turn to fruit and berries. For animal, bird or human that enjoys foraging, they are there to share and, for those not taken, to seed they go.

Our church buildings are often described as hidden treasures, with many of them having remained unchanged since the Reformation. Here they have stood for hundreds and even a thousand years, with purpose and presence. The church, of course, is more than a building, it is the people of God, who are in the business of following Jesus.

In Jesus' time, there were no church buildings and so when the word 'church' is used in the Bible it always refers to people. For the most part, early Christians were dependent on those who owned larger houses, providing a safe place for meeting. Early Christians were persecuted so meeting in a big public building would have been very risky!

Over the years, people have expressed and deepened their faith and devotion by gathering together and when homes became too small, and the Christian faith grew, large buildings were built to glorify God!

People living in our villages will all have different views of the importance of a church building and its purpose and significance in each community. Our buildings are sacred places of worship. They are a visible reminder of God's presence and the walls are soaked in prayer, song, words and music. The floors and pews hold the life stories of love, sorrow and new birth of hundreds of years. They are places for private, communal and public prayer, for reflection, stillness and where people may feel closer to God. They are also very practical places for people to meet together, find shelter and fellowship.

I wonder, are these sacred buildings and hidden treasures, losing their original purpose, even though they hold so much history and so many stories? I do hope not!

I invite you to take a visit to your local church building, to sense the stories of it's past, the spiritual sacredness that still fills it and to ponder on what your local church means to your community. You might even find some sacred space to reflect on your own 'hidden treasures'. As I ponder, I hope that neither our sacred buildings nor our own personal treasures are being hidden away, lost or even going to seed.

The following has been supplied by a reader, for which Thank You So Much:

'We plough the fields and scatter'

This is such a traditional Harvest hymn that many will recognise it when hearing the first few evocative plain notes. It is often used at a farmer's funeral even if it is not the season for 'ploughing and scattering'.

The hymn was written by a German, Matthias Claudius in 1783. He had written a poem for a rural harvest festival and this hymn was part of it and known as the Peasant's Song. It then appeared in Catholic and Protestant hymn books in Germany, the music being written by Schultz in 1800. It was translated into English in 1861. The hymn is used in Switzerland and in America for Thanksgiving.

As well as those evocative notes for the first line, we again have single notes before the start of the chorus.

Farmers still have the seasons for '*ploughing and scattering*' - or drilling as it is now called. The farmer waits for '*the breezes, the sunshine and soft refreshing rain*'. But it is often difficult to '*be thankful*' after deluges of rain or periods of drought.

The farmer is happy to harvest and gather the '*good gifts*' that then grace our shop shelves.

But not only must we be thankful for those '*good gifts around us*', we must also appreciate that supply can be fickle. Weather, political tensions between nations and ash clouds from volcanoes can all lead to some empty shelves in the supermarket.

The farmer, with God's help will do his best. He always has, and always will, just as God will continue to be maker of all things '*near and far*'.

Citizens Advice Tips

As music lovers gear up for a summer of festivals and big gigs, Citizens Advice is urging fans to watch out for ticket scams – and make sure they don't miss out on all the fun by falling for a fake.

Jane Parsons, Consumer Expert at Citizens Advice, said: "With so many people excited for a summer of live music, scammers see a golden opportunity to catch out event-goers with fake tickets.

Jane's top tips for people are:

1. Stick to official sellers: Buy tickets directly from the event organiser, venue, or official artist sites as this way you'll know it's genuine and at the original price. Don't buy tickets from a website if:

- it's offering tickets which aren't officially on sale yet
- it could be hard to contact the company selling them - for example if they only have a PO Box address and mobile number

2. Use fan-to-fan platforms and reselling sites carefully: If the event's sold out, you can try using reputable fan-to-fan resale sites that cap prices at face value and offer refunds if tickets turn out to be invalid or misdescribed.

Reselling (or secondary ticketing) sites resell tickets bought from official sellers and others, including private sellers. Some events have their own rules about reselling tickets or procedures for doing so and it's worth checking the terms and conditions of an event for this information before you spend any money.

You should also make sure the reselling site you use tells you:

- what kind of tickets you're buying - for example your seat number or if the tickets are for a standing area or has a restricted view
- your unique reference number for your tickets so that if you can't tell where you'll be sitting or standing you can use them to check with the original seller.

3. Always pay by card - never cash or bank transfer: You should pay for tickets online with a credit or debit card. If you use a card and there's a problem, for example the tickets are fake, your bank will usually help you get your money back. Be very careful if a reselling site asks you to pay by bank transfer - this might be a scam.

4. Watch out for red flags - if it's too good to be true, then it probably is: Be wary of vague listings, last-minute deals, or low prices that seem too good to be true. Scammers will also often say things like "only one left!" or "need to sell urgently" to push you into a quick sale — especially on social media or messaging apps. If a seller can't provide clear ticket details, refund terms, or asks to "DM you privately", think twice.

5. Don't fall for pressure tactics by private sellers: If you buy tickets from a private seller, you'll have little protection if you don't get what you expect - for example the tickets

don't arrive. It's best to meet the seller face to face before you pay them - meet them in a public place and take someone with you. Don't be tempted to buy from someone selling tickets in the street near the venue - the tickets might be fake.

If you've experienced a problem with ticket scams, you can **report any issues to Citizens Advice Consumer Service.**

Melinda Varcoe writes:

There's a distinctly wistful, sepia tinge to the month of September; if you only see it as the end of summer, you can find yourself indulging in the sort of melancholy and sentimental regret that the Portuguese call 'saudade'. On the other hand it can herald the most beautiful golden days, riots of gorgeous natural colour, fruitfulness and plenty, and the pleasant thought that it will soon be OK to light the fire in the evening and curl up with a book. See what I mean? It's all about attitude of mind.

And having things to look forward to - which brings me to The Proms, that absolutely amazing and wonderful feast of music, lasting two months, and culminating in the biggest, most life-affirming party of the year, The Last Night. This year it falls on Saturday 13th September, and will doubtless be the usual mixture of wonderful performances, high spirits, flags, hats, and utterly devoted music fans we've enjoyed for so many years – almost since Henry Wood first conducted his symphony orchestra in 1895, though things were a little more po-faced back then. Looking at the multiplicity of music and international performers in the 80 concerts this year is a humbling experience – I love it every year, but this year the concerts I've enjoyed seem to have been spectacularly good. Nowhere else in the world is this sort of quality and diversity celebrated with such professionalism, attention to detail, inclusivity and sheer joy, and whether we're flag-wavers or not, we can be proud of it. The huge affection evident between the Prommers and the performers is real, demonstrating an admiration and respect which means that even in a hall holding 5,900 over-excited enthusiasts, there are often moments when you could literally hear a pin drop.

Although it was in London's 18c pleasure gardens that informal 'promenade' concerts originated, allowing people to stroll about, eat and drink while enjoying music, it was impresario Robert Newman, who announced in rather patronising tones to Henry Wood in 1894, "[I want to run]... nightly concerts, and train the public by easy stages. Popular at first, gradually raising the standard until I have created a public for modern and classical music". The Proms have changed a great deal since then - would Newman and Sir Henry approve? - but they are a jewel in the crown of British music-making, and a summer treat which makes September just as exciting as July.

Incidentally, the totemic bronze bust of Henry Wood (which presides over all the Promenade concerts from in front of the Albert Hall organ) was rescued from the ruins of the bombed-out Queens Hall in 1941. On the last night he sports a well-deserved laurel wreath donated by the Prommers, and spends the rest of the year overseeing activities at the Royal Academy of Music!

"In this workshop we'll learn how to take a piece of wood and, with simple hand tools, create something lasting, unique and beautiful. Everyone is welcome, from absolute beginner to experienced craftsman, and there will be hands-on guidance for every step of the process. All tools and materials are provided, as is protective equipment. The bowls and

spoons we can make are universal objects, used by humans for millennia. They have no moving parts, require no operating manual, and can be any shape or size.

Fashioning things with our hands is a skill that has been rather forgotten in our digital age, but with nothing more elaborate than a knife and a piece of wood, it's possible to focus, create and meditate at the same time. There's so much untapped self-esteem and confidence that comes from holding something in your hand that didn't exist before; if you can take it home and use it to do something as primal as feeding yourself, then that's a precious thing indeed. The idea that somewhere inside a nondescript log or branch could be a spoon, a musical instrument or a work of art is really quite something!"

Garden Clippings

To our surprise and delight the seemingly lone cob swan, seen sitting forlornly on the riverbank for a few weeks, proudly swam, with his head held high, into the millpond accompanied by his mate and six small cygnets during early June! No nest in our garden this year but obviously a superior spot had been found downstream from us. Very pleased to report that at the time of writing the cygnets are probably half grown and all six have survived thus far.

On the duckling front there have been some successes with a now independent group of five youngsters regularly in the garden and two younger broods, still with their mothers, also of five. They all troop up to outside the kitchen window at various times of the day to feed on the food I put out there for them. The smaller ducklings are hilarious as they suddenly hurtle up the back lawn towards the house and up the sloping path which leads to the area outside our back door visible from the kitchen. Mother duck just about keeping up behind them! It is amazing how quickly they arrive at the back door, I only just have time to throw out some food for them sometimes!

At last the rain came and helped to restore, to a small degree, some of the parched and wilting plants and shrubs in the garden. A pigeon was obviously very pleased to have a heavy downpour to enjoy as it sat on the electricity cable to the house, raising first one wing and then the other to take full advantage of a much-needed shower! The fruit trees are so laden with fruit that branches are bowed and some have snapped in the recent strong winds. It certainly would appear that a bumper harvest is ahead. The crab apple in the vegetable garden is probably the most laden with branches touching the ground with the sheer weight of fruit and possibly the lack of rainfall not helping either. I had a good harvest of gooseberries and managed to make several jars of jam. The blackcurrants all disappeared as the blackbirds tucked into those! I didn't begrudge them the fruit in the parched conditions. Of course, the fabulous numbers of butterflies in the garden has been such a treat and joy to observe. Literally clouds of them around certain plants when in flower throughout the summer. Dragonflies and damsel flies equally prolific.

Watering seems to have been a rather endless task. A great sigh of relief when the rain does come and an evening off watering for a change! We have managed to eke out the water supply in at least some of our numerous water butts dotted around the house, garage and garden sheds. The furthest away butts obviously being the ones not to run dry! We erect a large market stall type awning along the back terrace during the summer months. This is a great way of collecting rainwater as it runs off in rivulets at certain points and into an array of buckets and containers positioned along each side of its length. These are then used to top up the water butts. A lot of effort but we have only used the hosepipe for filling watering cans on rare occasions. We have a few sweetcorn plants which are now forming their cobs. After our last effort a few years back, and the complete destruction of the plants by badgers on the night prior to picking the much-anticipated cobs, we have taken action to protect them. A circle of sheep wire netting, then chicken wire netting on top, held firmly in place. Badgers can squeeze through sheep wire, incredibly, hence the addition of chicken wire! We can only hope this is enough to keep the badgers at bay!

While the haymaking was in progress on Shalford Meadow, opposite our house, we observed the almost immediate arrival of several buzzards and kites as the farm machinery began cutting the grass and leaving it in neat rows to dry. They were circling around like vultures in the hope of grabbing a meal. On another day, after some rain earlier in the morning, I was spellbound watching a flight of swallows diving and swooping all around the tractor and the mower behind. There must have been at least twenty of them, impossible to count. I spoke to the young man who had been operating the tractor later, and he said he was equally delighted to see them and was pleased to say that despite their apparent daredevil swooping close to the machinery not one was injured. **S.B.**



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

V.J. Day On The Village Green



On Friday August the 15th at 11.45am 56 people from the village and elsewhere gathered together outside the village hall to commemorate the 80th anniversary of VJ Day. The service was led by Ann Robertson who spoke about the villagers Tom Hearn, Toby Rash and Ted Spencer who had embarked on a long sea voyage at the start of the war, not knowing where they were going. On arriving in India and then onwards into Burma they faced challenges in stark contrast to their quiet village lives....from snakes and insects to dysentery and imprisonment in Japanese camps. She spoke about the love and support of Christ through all adversities, and our hope for peace in the world. A tropical wreath was laid at the foot of the soldier statue by Margaret Hearn, Tom's widow, who wore her husband's Burma Star and his bush hat. The wreath marked our grateful thanks to all who served in the Far East, and for those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. After the two minute silence at 12.00noon Martin Gosling provided a fly past with impeccable timing. A poem was read by Derek Stokes written by Brenda Wilson, one of the first female town criers. She read this on the bridge over the River Kwai in 1995 to mark the fiftieth anniversary of VJ Day.

After the service refreshments were served in the Village Hall and over 40 stayed for the WI's sandwich and cake lunch. Villagers were able to look at the exhibition of Far East memorabilia including some of Ted Spencer's letters, a pilot officer's tropical uniform and photo albums from the time.

In the evening the church bells were rung, and after dark villagers gathered around the lit beacon with sparklers to raise a glass to our brave servicemen and women.

W.I. - July

At our July meeting, the WSP W.I. members met Brenda Willison, Town Crier of Newmarket, who needed no introduction as she was dressed in a splendid Town Crier's outfit. Brenda's talk began with some history about Town Criers, it is thought that the first ones appeared in Ancient Greece in 776 BC. Then in 1066, King Harold gave Certificates of Protection to Town Criers as they often had to deliver bad news and were not very popular. Town Criers tended to attract attention by ringing a bell followed by their cry, three times "O Ye" which comes from the Old French for "Listen". Town Criers had to be literate, wore tricorn hats with a feather (some made from swan feathers) that could be used as a pen to write messages, these quills could then be put into a fold in the hat if they had to ride from one town to another. By the eighteenth century, town criers often acted as watchmen informing people that 'all was well' after curfew. They also rang their bells when leading local men to deal with fires that might break out. However, their main function was to deliver news or important information in towns

Brenda became a Town Crier in 1987 when a local newspaper in Peterborough invited applications for the role for which her daughters applied on her behalf as she had such a loud voice. Her voice certainly boomed out in our hall when she joined in with Jerusalem – we later heard her voice measured 109 decibels (Concorde is a mere 105 decibels!). She was one of only two women in the twenty competing for the role. She became a deputy Town Crier for Peterborough before being adopted for the full post by Market Deeping where she remained for 21 years, later becoming the Town Crier for Bakewell. Brenda is one of 26 women out of about 250 town criers in Britain, a role that she thoroughly enjoys and through the years has furnished her with many amusing anecdotes she relates during her presentations. Her duties are voluntary, she is called upon for a

variety of occasions during the year including the local carnival, Christmas events, and she has competed in national and world competitions.

Brenda is proud of her collection of bells, her oldest one from 1462, one made for her by the famous bell makers Taylors of Loughborough and she also has her original school bell.

WSP W.I. Mid-Norfolk Railway Trip from Dereham to Wymondham Abbey

30th July 2025

Thirty-four members of Wickham St Pauls W.I., plus twelve guests travelled by coach to Dereham in Norfolk on a lovely sunny day to board The Mid-Norfolk Railway for a 22 mile round trip stopping halfway to view Wymondham Abbey Church.

Unfortunately, the usual steam train was unable to be used for this trip due to the extremely hot dry weather in case of sparks from the engine straying into the crop fields and starting a fire, therefore it had to be replaced with a diesel train.

Tickets were issued before boarding, clipped by a Ticket Inspector during the journey, using a machine that cut out a miniature shape of a steam locomotive.

While travelling along the countryside the Train Guard gave us a history of the line, naming the small stations we passed by and other interesting facts. This line is run by volunteers with the upkeep covered by these train trips, also running the Polar Express at Xmas, for children encouraged to wear pyjamas for the trip and the story re-enacted by actors. Another form of income is generated by storing carriages in their sidings that have been sold to other countries and are waiting to be shipped.

Following this delightful ride it was all on to The Greenstone pub for a delicious meal, everyone enjoying the excellent service from the very friendly staff.


